Item Description

Early 19th Century black Basal tware sugar bowl by William Baddley, circa 1802. William Baddley active between 1802 and 1822 descended from a family of potters and established his factory in Eastwood, Hanley, in Stoke-on-Trent, Staffordshire.

Black Basalt ware is a dry-bodied stoneware fired in an oxidizing atmosphere to produce a black fabric. It was originally used by Josiah Wedgwood for his famous Etruscan vases and it continued later in use for such everyday items such as tea wares.
